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MOBILE DENTAL CLINIC PROJECT

Oral health is a fundamental aspect of overall well-being, yet it often remains overlooked in public health discussions. This neglect can lead to significant disparities in health outcomes, particularly among marginalized communities who face barriers such as financial constraints, lack of awareness, and limited access to dental care services. Oral health outreach programs are essential in addressing



these issues by providing education, preventive care, and early treatment options to underserved populations.

These programs play a crucial role in reducing health disparities by promoting awareness and access to dental care, which can significantly lower the incidence of oral diseases. They also contribute to improving overall health outcomes,

as poor oral health is linked to various systemic conditions like cardiovascular disease and diabetes. Furthermore, outreach initiatives enhance the quality of life for individuals by alleviating pain and social stigma associated with oral diseases

Keeping in view of the above facts; Maulana Azad Institute of Health Sciences under GNCT, Delhi initiated Mobile Dental Clinic Project under the umbrella of NHM/DSHM to provide Primary, Preventive, Promotive and Curative oral/ dental health care to underserved areas of NCT, Delhi on 1st May. 2014. **It is the “First of its Kind” project in India for Dental Outreach services.** The Program provides Dental Screening and treatment services, Dental Health Education and Capacity Building activities along with continuous quality assessment along with research.

The Six specially designed Mobile Dental Clinics cater to underserved population of Delhi. The Project aims to achieve the goals of the “Oral Health for All” by improving the access to Primary Oral Health Services. Further, the Project attempts to integrate the existing Health Care delivery services with the dental/oral services through an integrated need based dental care strategy. The Project has gradually evolved into various sub-components/ sub-initiatives targeting different special groups.

The various sub-initiatives are:

1. **Project NEEV: School Oral Health Care Program**
2. **Project ASHA HUMARI MUSKAAN: Maternal Oral healthcare Program**
3. **Project AMMA: Comprehensive Oral health care for Elderly**
4. **Project COPS: Community Oral Pre-cancer Screening and Tobacco Cessation Services**
5. **Oral Healthcare for Persons with Disabilities.**
6. **Oral health Education and Awareness Campaigns**

PROJECT'S OUTREACH

The Project is providing dental care services in all 11 districts of GNCT of Delhi.



SCOPE OF SERVICES



The Mobile Dental Teams are catering to various areas/districts of Delhi in a scheduled fashion for 05 days in a week (Monday to Friday from 09.30 am to 02.00 pm).



For optimum utilization of the Project and patient care; the teams work in coordination currently with the following areas:

- Delhi Govt. Dispensaries
- Schools under Department of Education, GNCT of Delhi
- Capacity Building Programs in collaboration with District ASHA Coordinators in all Districts.
- Senior Citizen Recreational Clubs under Department of Social Welfare and Social Justice, GNCT of Delhi.

These collaborative efforts are done to delivery of Primary, Preventive and Secondary level of dental care services to all vulnerable groups as well as communities across Delhi.

The range of treatment services provided includes:

1. Dental Screening
2. Dental restorations/tooth fillings
3. Oral Prophylaxis/teeth cleaning
4. Tooth Extraction
5. Root Canal Treatment
6. Dental Prosthetic treatments (Partial and Complete Dentures)
7. Tobacco cessation counselling
8. Oral Precancerous /Potentially malignant lesion screening
9. Preventive Treatment services like pit and fissure sealant applications, fluoride varnishes etc.
10. Medication (in liaison with dispensaries) & Referral for tertiary care

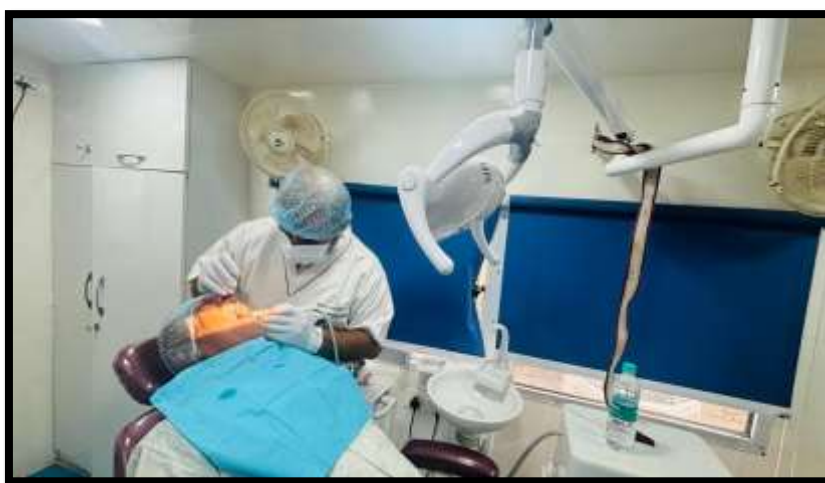
The teams from Mobile Dental Clinic Project visit the locations for five days a week on rotational basis from 9:30 A.M. to 2 P.M.

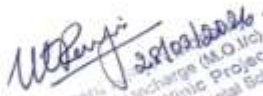

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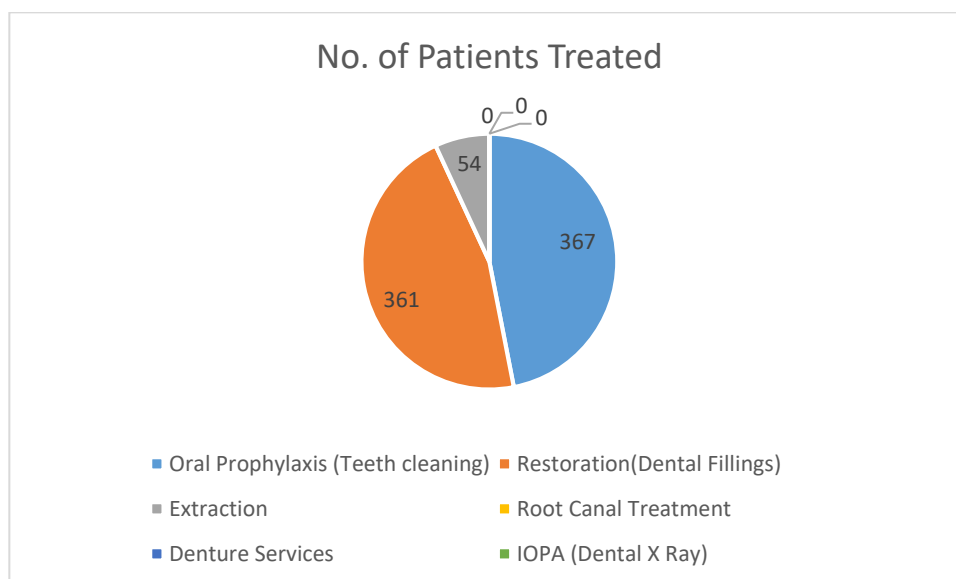


Fig. 1 Details of Dental Treatment provided

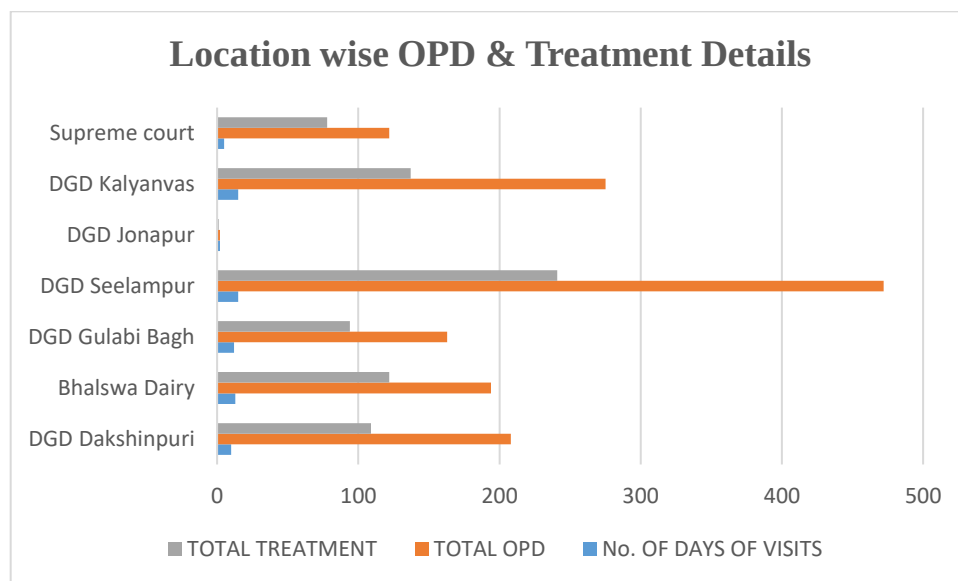


Fig.2 - Location wise OPD Details & Treatment Details

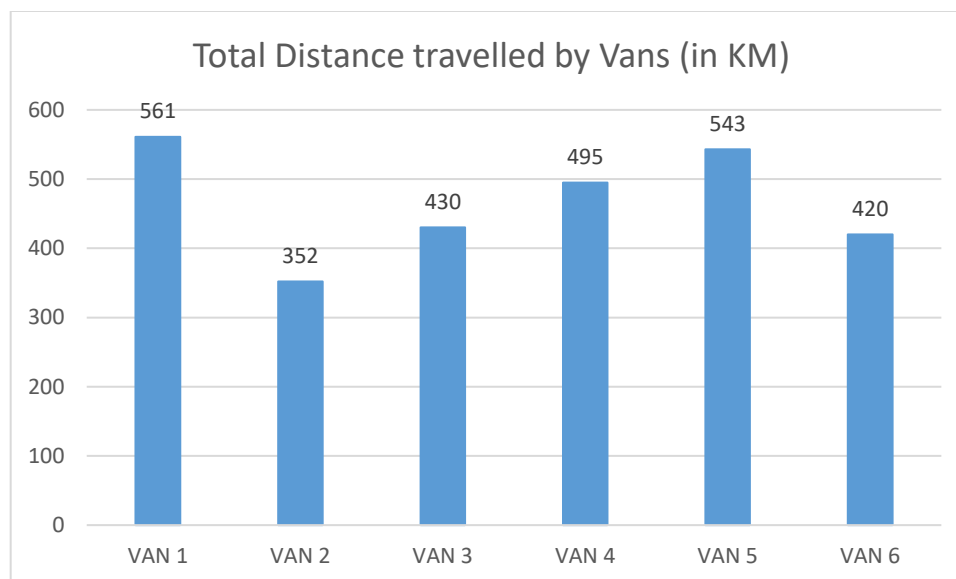


Fig. 03: Details of Distance travelled by Vans

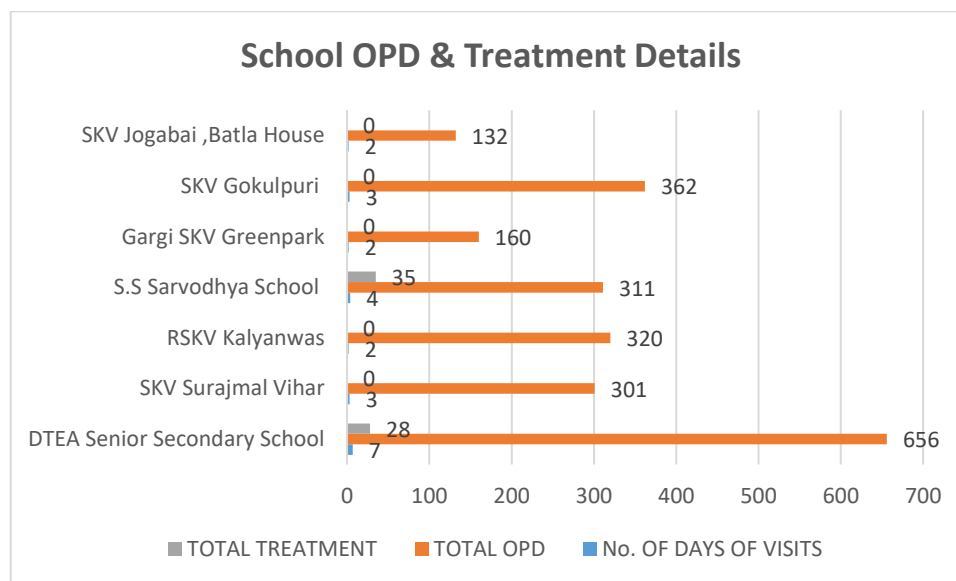


Fig. 04: Details of School OPD & Treatment Details

Oral diseases are the most common disease that affects people throughout their life time.



The Global Burden of Disease Study 2017 estimated that oral disease affects at least 3.58 billion people worldwide. Oral health is fundamental to general health and well-being. A

healthy mouth enables an individual to speak, eat and socialize without experiencing active disease, discomfort or embarrassment. Children who suffer from poor oral health are twelve times more likely to have restricted activity days than those who don't. Schools are microcosms of the larger community.



With existing structures and systems in place, schools provide excellent opportunities for integrating oral health into the curriculum that is acceptable, appropriate and effective. Children are receptive to guidance and they are familiar with the learning environment and culture in school. Schools can effectively inform and influence students'



oral health knowledge, beliefs, attitudes and behaviour. It is important to target children, particularly at kindergartens and primary schools. Pupils need to acquire knowledge and skills that facilitate a healthy lifestyle and help them cope with social and peer

pressure. Children are empowered to take control over their own health early in their lives and are encouraged to develop positive attitudes toward preventive measures.

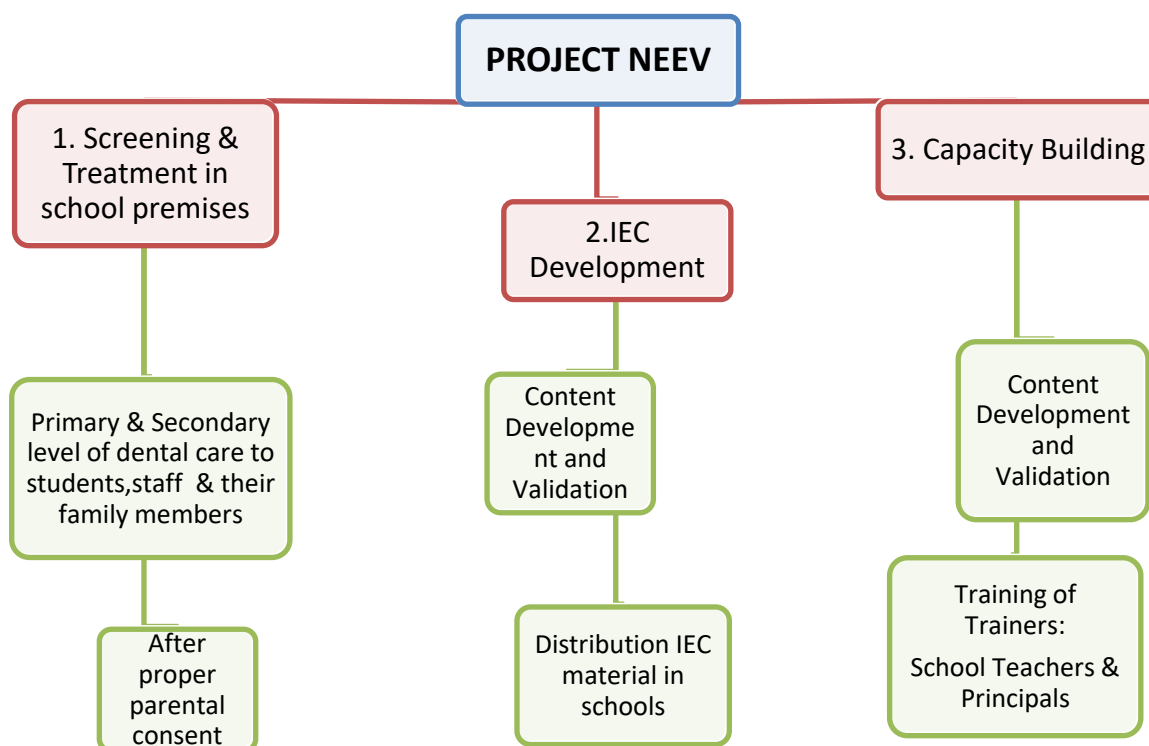
Hence providing incremental oral health care in schools could prove pivotal in changing the current scenario of huge oral disease burden and large component of dental unmet needs.

Keeping in view of the above facts; the Mobile Dental Clinic Project initiated Project "Neev" in collaboration with School Health Scheme, since September 2014. The Program included Dental Health Education and Dental Screening with preventive Dental procedures. One day



per week i.e. Wednesday was dedicated to School Oral health program. **It is a comprehensive oral health program for Govt. school children in rural areas encouraging the concept of health Promoting Schools.** Since Feb. 2016, treatment component was also added to provide dental treatment within school premises. It is a comprehensive oral health program for Govt. school children in rural areas encouraging the concept of health Promoting Schools.

2. PROJECT AMMA: COMPREHENSIVE ORAL HEALTHCARE FOR ELDERLY

The global population is growing as well as ageing. The age structure of the population is changing owing to demographic transition with increasing levels of life expectancy and decreasing levels of fertility in almost all countries, leading to an increase in both the share and number of older persons

across world. With increasing life expectancy, the burden of Non-Communicable diseases a matter of concern for the community. According to Population Census 2011 there are nearly 104 million elderly persons (aged 60 years or above) in India; 53 million females and 51 million males. 5.9% of the population of Delhi comprises of citizens aged 60+.¹ The projections indicate that the number of 60+ in Delhi will increase to 24.24 Lakhs in 2026. Continuous increase in life expectancy means that more people are now living longer.

Huge burden of Oral Diseases among Geriatric Population

To cater to the demand of high unmet health needs of geriatric population the concept of



Geriatric day/Senior Citizen OPD Day is already existent in Delhi Govt. Dispensaries and Hospitals. However, oral health often remains neglected and an under-served realm. Almost 20% of the patients reporting to the OPD of Mobile Dental Clinics belong to geriatric population such that on an average 450 to 500 patients per month seek dental care in Mobile dental vans. Almost 39% of the patients diagnosed with dental caries and 33% of the patients suffering from gingival/periodontal diseases belong to geriatric population clearly indicating high

burden of oral diseases amongst this special group. Almost 14 % of the geriatric population suffer from edentulousness. This not only affects their general health but also affects the quality of life in general. A considerable number of geriatric populations have limited knowledge of the cause and prevention of oral disease as well.

Providing primary and secondary level of dental care to the geriatric population through a Comprehensive oral health care Program for Elderly s vital for a country like India which has a significant proportion of elderly population. Hence, considering the huge unmet dental need of the elderly population of GNCTD; the Mobile Dental Clinic Project has initiated **PROJECT “AMMA: COMPREHENSIVE ORAL HEALTHCARE PROGRAM FOR THE ELDERLY.”** The program has been initiated with collaboration with Department of Social Welfare & Security which supervises old age homes and Senior Citizen’s Recreation Centres under GNCTD for further coordination and organizing various activities. The Project has expanded its horizon by initiating Free Denture delivery services to the patients of Project AMMA. November 2024 marks the launch of an innovative initiative under Project AMMA of Mobile Dental Clinic Project: “Free Denture Delivery”.

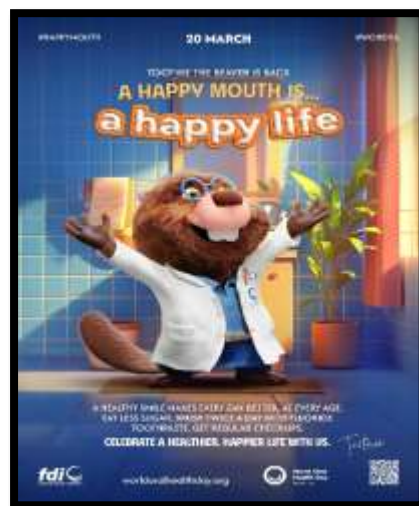

3. HEALTH PROMOTIONAL, CAPACITY BUILDING AND TEAM BUILDING ACTIVITIES

A. CELEBRATION OF WORLD ORAL HEALTH DAY 2026: World Oral Health Day is celebrated every year on 20th March to raise awareness about the importance of maintaining good oral hygiene and its direct impact on overall health and well-being. The theme for World Oral Health Day 2026, “**A Happy Mouth is a Happy Life,**” emphasizes that a healthy mouth enables individuals to eat, speak, and socialize confidently, thereby improving their overall quality of life. Poor oral health can lead to pain, discomfort, and various systemic health issues, making its prevention and care essential.



Month long activities starting from 20th March 2026 till 19th April 2026 were observed. Details of the activities conducted in Delhi Government Dispensaries in the month of April are as under:

- i) **WORLD ORAL HEALTH DAY CELEBRATION AT DGD DAKSHINPURI:** World Oral Health Day was celebrated on 1st April 2026 at DGD Dakshinpuri with the objective of promoting awareness about the importance of maintaining good oral hygiene for overall health and well-being. The theme for this year, “A Happy Mouth is a Happy Mind,” emphasized the



need for adopting daily oral care practices and regular dental visits. The event was organized by Dr. Swati Jain and Dr. Annudeep Bajaj.

The program aimed to educate both children and adults on correct brushing and flossing techniques, highlight the association between oral health and systemic diseases such as diabetes and heart disease, and provide screening for common dental problems including dental caries, gum diseases, and malocclusion. An awareness talk was conducted focusing on the causes and prevention of dental caries and gingival diseases, along with the importance of fluoride use, sugar control, and routine dental check-ups.

A practical demonstration of proper brushing technique was carried out using models and soft toothbrushes, encouraging active participation from children and community members. A free oral health screening camp was organized for patients as well as dispensary staff, which was well appreciated by the Medical Officer In-Charge. Additionally, a quiz competition was conducted to reinforce

knowledge, and participants who answered correctly were rewarded with oral health kits.

Overall, the event successfully conveyed key messages, with participants gaining a clear understanding of maintaining oral hygiene through brushing twice daily, reducing sugar intake, and visiting a dentist at least twice a year.

ii) WORLD ORAL HEALTH DAY CELEBRATION AT DGD JONAPUR:



World Oral Health Day was successfully conducted at Jonapur Dispensary on 2nd April 2026 by the team members Dr. Neha Singh and Dr. Deepak Verma. The theme for this year, “A Happy Mouth is a Happy Life,” was effectively

highlighted throughout the session.

An oral health awareness talk was delivered to approximately 60 patients, emphasizing the importance of maintaining good oral hygiene and its impact on overall health and well-being. To enhance engagement, a quiz competition was organized, and oral health kits were distributed among participants as a reward.



A live demonstration of proper brushing techniques was also conducted, helping patients understand the correct method of maintaining oral hygiene. The session was interactive and well-received, successfully promoting awareness and encouraging the adoption of healthy oral care practices among the attendees.

iii) WORLD ORAL HEALTH DAY CELEBRATION AT SUPREME COURT

DISPENSARY: World Oral Health Day was celebrated at Supreme Court Dispensary on 9th April 2026 by Dr. Swati and Dr. Girish to raise awareness



about the importance of maintaining good oral hygiene and its impact on overall health and well-being. The celebration was conducted in line with this year's theme, "A Happy Mouth is a Happy Mind," emphasizing the need for

adopting healthy daily oral-care habits and regular dental visits. During the

event, a comprehensive health talk was delivered, covering topics such as causes and prevention of dental caries and gum diseases, the importance of fluoride use, limiting sugar intake, and maintaining regular dental check-ups. To make the



session more interactive and engaging, a quiz competition was organized for the attendees, helping reinforce key oral health messages. Participants who answered correctly were rewarded with oral health kits, which were also distributed to encourage good hygiene practices. The activity was well received by the participants, and it effectively promoted awareness about simple yet essential habits such as brushing twice daily, reducing sugar consumption, and visiting a dentist regularly.

iv) WORLD ORAL HEALTH DAY CELEBRATION AT DGD BHALASWA

DAIRY: World Oral Health Day was successfully celebrated at Bhalaswa Dairy on 16/04/2026 by Dr. Divyangi Goel and Dr. Nishtha. The program was



organized to spread awareness about the importance of maintaining good oral hygiene and its role in overall health and well-being, in line with the theme promoting healthy oral-care practices.

The event included a comprehensive health

talk focusing on the prevention of common dental diseases such as dental caries and gum diseases, along with the importance of regular brushing, limiting sugar intake, and routine dental check-ups. This was followed by an interactive quiz competition to engage participants and assess their understanding of oral health practices. A practical demonstration of correct brushing techniques was also conducted to help participants adopt proper oral hygiene habits in their daily lives. A total of 24 participants attended the session and actively participated in all activities. The program was well received, with participants showing keen interest and enthusiasm throughout. Overall, the event was successful in creating



awareness and encouraging the community to follow healthy oral hygiene practices.

B. ANC DAY CELEBRATION AT DGD KALYANVAS: ANC Day was celebrated on 07/04/2026 at DGD Kalyanvas, where Dr. Swati Jain and Dr. Annudeep Bajaj



along with other team members conducted an oral health awareness session for the beneficiaries. An informative oral health talk was

delivered, emphasizing the importance of maintaining good oral hygiene during pregnancy and its role in ensuring maternal and child well-being. A demonstration of the correct tooth-brushing technique was also conducted to encourage the adoption of healthy oral hygiene practices among the participants.



C. WORLD HEALTH DAY CELEBARTION AT DGD GULABI BAGH AND

DGD DAKSHINPURI: World Health Day was celebrated on 07/04/2026 at DGD Gulabi Bagh and DGD Dakshinpuri with the objective



of promoting awareness about the importance of oral health as an integral component of overall health and well-



being. The event witnessed active participation from beneficiaries attending the facilities.

As part of the celebration, an oral health awareness talk was conducted, focusing on the prevention of common oral diseases, the importance of maintaining proper oral hygiene, and the relationship between oral health and general health. Participants were educated about healthy dietary habits and the significance of regular dental check-ups in preventing dental problems.

A live demonstration of the correct tooth-brushing technique was also conducted to encourage the adoption of effective oral hygiene practices. In addition, oral health check-ups were carried out for the beneficiaries, and individualized counselling was provided regarding oral hygiene maintenance and the need for timely dental treatment wherever required.

D. ASHA TRAINING AT DGD SEELAMPUR: An ASHA training session was



conducted at DGD Seelampur on 10/04/2026 by Dr. Girish and Dr. Mehak and team. A total of 28 ASHA workers participated in the training, which focused on oral health promotion and methods of addressing common oral health concerns among the general

public.

During the session, an oral health talk was delivered covering the importance of maintaining good oral hygiene, prevention of common dental diseases, and the significance of



early dental consultation. The correct tooth-brushing technique was also demonstrated to provide practical knowledge and enable ASHA workers to effectively educate community members. The training helped strengthen the capacity of ASHA workers to promote oral health awareness and encourage healthy oral hygiene practices in their respective areas.

5. Monitoring & Evaluation of Mobile Dental Clinic Project

A. Digitalized Feedback Form

Monitoring and evaluation (M&E) are critical components of the Mobile Dental Clinic Project to ensure its effectiveness, efficiency, and continuous improvement. The M&E framework of the project focuses on assessing service quality, patient satisfaction, and the overall impact of dental outreach activities. In a recent innovation aimed at strengthening the evaluation process, the Consultant, Dr. Swati Jain, to systematically capture patient responses and assess the project's outcomes more accurately and efficiently, developed a Digital Feedback Form.



To facilitate easy access, a QR code was generated, allowing patients to conveniently scan and fill the digital form using their smartphones immediately after receiving treatment. This innovation has modernized the feedback collection process by replacing paper-based forms, reducing manual errors, and ensure real time data collection and analysis. The digital feedback system became

operational on 21st April 2025, marking a significant step forward in patient engagement and project assessment. In the month of February 2026, a total of 126 digital feedback forms were successfully filled out by patients reflecting encouraging participation and acceptance of the new system. The collected feedback is currently being analysed to derive insights into patient satisfaction, service quality, and areas needing improvement. This data-driven approach will significantly contribute to enhancing service delivery and strategic planning for future mobile dental camps.
